Chris made it through a super competitive selection process and emerged as our new Vicar designate. Everyone is thrilled with the decision but, we still have a bit of a transition period ahead. Chris will officially become our Vicar next Spring or early summer, so that he can focus on this vital training/development year. In the meantime, Chris will continue as a "pioneer curate-in-training".

Chris will lead us in services and ministry/ pastoral issues and other activities but he will still need our support as he takes time to complete his studies and prepare for his new role. It's also an opportunity for us to develop our own ministries within the church. We can think about where we see ourselves and what roles we want to play in the future of our church, not just what we can do to help during the next few months

Exciting News to Share about the Church Garden Boundary Wall.

You might have noticed that some repairs are already underway to the infamous wall. Well, here's the story:



After the original contractor backed out, a local builder, John Walsh, stepped up and offered a competitive bid with some clever cost-saving measures. With support from the diocesan architect, the archdeacon gave his approval, and work finally started! We've been working on preventative repairs on the Handen Road section first because it turned out that we really needed to do something to prevent a collapse like the one at Wantage Road. We originally thought that the Handen Road wall was 'A stitch in time saves nine'! And we'll be starting work on Wantage Road in

Our thanks for all your amazing fundraising efforts, including the GoFundMe appeal, digging into church reserves and grants, we've managed to cover our original target! All this amazing support means we can confidently go ahead with the works. We're still open for contributions to the Handen Road stretch target, but we're confident that we'll have the money by the time the project is complete.

Their congregation loved bringing in food to have in coffee hour. It was quite a brunch!

The Rector has been in post for a year. Before that the Parish was in vacancy for 3 years which was a challenging time but the Church is recovering well. The Rector, Jill, sends her best wishes to The Good Shepherd Lee.

The Good Shepherd of the Hills lost some more conservative members to nearby Christ Church Anglican Church, a conservative traditional parish, part of a breakaway Anglican Province from the



Episcopal Church but had gained some from Christ Church when that church had broken away and were now seeing some other members return since the Good Shepherd vacancy was filled.

The Rev Jill's sermon emphasised the need not just to keep the rules of the faith but to speak up for those who could not speak up for themselves. A brave message in today's environment in the states. She sees that the church's role is to be a place where living stones are turned to have their rough edges smoothed. In a divided society the prophetic way is possibly the middle ground.

As another inclusive church we can draw hope from their experience and perhaps pray for each other.

Open the Doors

We are finally making some progress on the 'Give to Go Green' church doors project to draught proof the lobbies at the back of church and make the doors by the ramp wheelchair accessible.

GIVE TO GO GREEN

The proposal is to rehang the outer doors which are draughty and to replace the inner doors with new oak veneered solid core doors with glass panels to allow visibility into the church. The lobby doors into church by the ramp will be power assisted with a push button for wheelchair users.

We have had a number of delays on this project due to issues with quotes for the work, but we now have acceptable quotes and have received a grant from the Marshall's charity of £8,000 towards the work in addition to the £7,000 from our fund raising and the "Give to Go Green" grant matched funding.

We expect the work to start by the beginning of September with the fitting

of the doors, followed by the work on automating the accessible doors in October

Once this work is completed we can look to redecorate the lobbies, funded from the normal maintenance budget.

Lee Green Open Studios

Every November the Good Shepherd hosts 'Lee Green Open Studios' – an event which showcases the work of local artists, craftspeople and makers. It's a brilliant opportunity to welcome hundreds of people into church, who wouldn't otherwise come into our buildings.


This year Open Studios takes place on the weekends of Saturday and Sunday 15th-16th and 22nd – 23rd November, from 12 – 5pm each day. If you've never been before, people display their work in both the hall and the church – even in the choir stalls and pews! To help make people feel welcome, we also offer refreshments during Open Studios. This is a way of us showing off our baking skills, generating some funds for church, and encouraging people to take a bit of time to enjoy some hospitality.

One of the best things about Open Studios, is seeing local people - who are not regular church-goers - feeling so welcome and at home in their parish church. It's also a great opportunity to invite people to come back again at Christmas. As in previous years, we'd LOVE some help over the two Open Studios weekends. We need people to donate homemade cakes, make and serve refreshments, help run the Fairtrade Stall, and to open up and lock up. In previous years Open Studios has also been a great way for church members to get to know one another better as they've spent an hour in the kitchen serving cake and washing up. Plus, you might manage to get a bit of Christmas shopping done at the same time!

Augustine the African by Catherine Conybeare

Augustine of Hippo is one of the world's most influential theologians, an early Christian writer whose work shaped the course of Western philosophy. Born in




Numidia in 354 CE, Augustine's African

identity has long been painfully denied. But it was foundational to his thinking and faith. Now, world-renowned scholar Catherine Conybeare traces Augustine's travels from North Africa to the European continent and back again, placing his African origins firmly at the centre of his story.

What follows is a tale of exile, faith and identity. Augustine the African upends conventional knowledge about one of Christianity's most celebrated early fathers, and recentres Africa as the locus of early Catholic intellectual activity - with Europe on the periphery.
